
What is Dystopian Fiction?



With the Internet and the television being piped into your brain at all times, they've got you under careful control.




***Ship Breaker* by Paolo Bacigalupi**

***The Compound* by S.A. Bodeen**




Eli's family survived the nuclear war in their bunker, but six years on, things just aren't quite right. You don't leave the bunker and you certainly don't ask questions.


***The Maze Runner Trilogy* by James Dashner**
